Bringing your soil back to health

I am a plant manager of a hydro-electric power plant during the day, and find relaxation in gardening in my spare time. It was always a dream of mine to own a few acres of land and start a nut and fruit tree farm, so I bought some land in Paradise Valley. I have planted over 300 fruit and nut bearing trees and shrubs, and have nearly a thousand nut tree seedlings on the go for future planting. In addition, I have a large vegetable garden which provides my family with fresh and wholesome food.

In the 25+ years I have been seriously gardening on my own, I have tried many different methods to grow the best tasting, most nutritious foods. What works best for me so far is mostly organic farming, with natural mineral supplements in the correct balance. With pre and post application soil testing by

a professional lab, I have improved my soil health greatly and have had great success with my crops.

However, correcting and balancing my soil with these organic and mineral supplements may not be sustainable. Items like rock phosphorous, and the different types of limes for example, while considered organic, are not sustainable in the long term. With our heavy rains, calcium and magnesium are leached out of the soil, and have to be applied annually.

Over the years I have been discussing farming with Ferdinand who is a close neighbour. He was always extolling the virtues of biodynamic farming. I became interested

and borrowed a copy of Steiner’s *Agriculture* from Ferdinand. While I have a lot to learn, I believe that it may be a very sustainable way to farm for a future where other farm inputs may be in short supply. I am looking forward to gaining knowledge in biodynamics, and to see the soil improvements and ongoing soil vitality from utilizing Steiner’s methods. ☼

Para él la cuestión de la educación de los niños es algo muy frágil "y por eso tenemos que darles tiempo, todos los que están involucrados en esto lo saben muy bien", indica de manera que no quieren apresurarse a hacer exámenes y pruebas, "eso se puede hacer con las plantas pero no con los niños".

A decir del también ecologista hay mucha confianza expresada por parte de quienes han presenciado sus exposiciones "y queremos que el proyecto Waldorf sea algo generado y creado localmente no algo importado desde Europa, ni siquiera importado de experiencias de otros estado de México, sino que debe ser creado y desarrollado aquí y por eso necesita un poco más de tiempo", insiste.

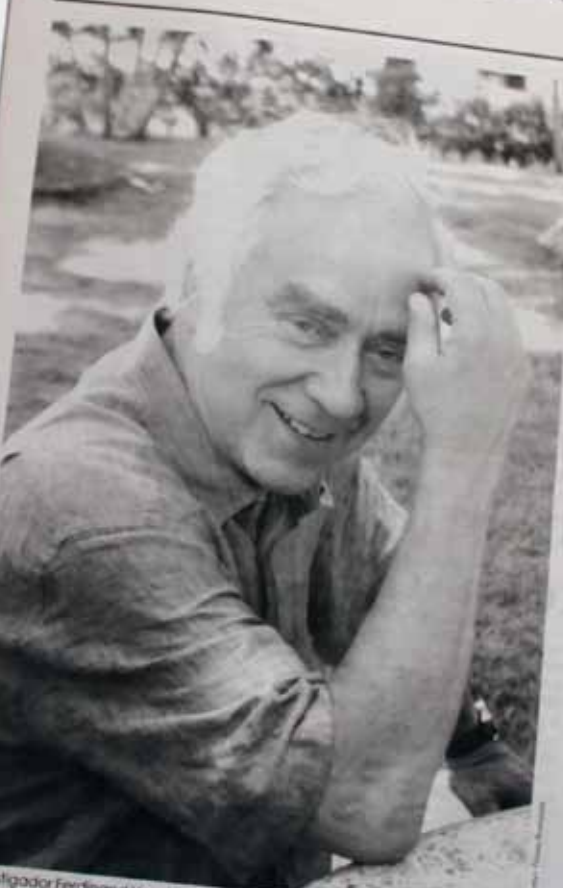

Sobre todo dice ahora que se está presentando el problema de la enfermedad de los cítricos --dragón amarillo-- que considera "es urgente que se atienda, no podemos seguir simplemente en lo químico, también debemos ir hacia lo natural".

Pues asegura que ellos tienen medicinas naturales que pueden ayudar "y eso sería muy importante -- dice -- así como fuimos invitados por el secretario de educación y entonces estamos compartiendo y dando información".

Making biodynamic magic in



Fifteen years ago Ferdinand Vondruska, owner of C-Dar Lodge, travelled to Mexico and became aware of Mexico as a rather different culture to what we have in the U.S. and Canada.

Planting the seeds of change

“And then I realized also that there were enormous agricultural problems,” he said.

A Mexican friend introduced Vondruska to a gentleman in Leon, Mexico who was a yoga teacher. “He brought me closer to the people in Mexico,” said Vondruska.

This encounter planted the seeds for Vondruska’s vision to bring biodynamics to Mexico and sure enough, a few months later the first biodynamic course was held in Sierra de Lobos, thanks to this connection. Although there was a small turn-out, interest in biodynamics was piqued with local farmers and “out of this came the need for biodynamic preparation making,” said Vondruska which they undertook in further courses.

After a pause for a couple of years, due to life getting in the way, as he explained it, Vondruska once again returned to Mexico and revived his biodynamic cause. He headed out from Mexico City to a town located two hours outside the city to find a Waldorf school and was warmly welcomed by the teachers. “I said to them that I could offer... how Waldorf School teachers could introduce gardening to the children. So a biodynamic program was introduced into the Waldorf teacher training course.”

Given over the duration of two weeks, 38 teachers signed up for Vondruska’s course, and now, eight years on, biodynamic courses are now offered all over the country. “From there it spread all the way to Merida to Vera Cruz, to Cancun, to the west coast, and north. I basically have representatives from every part of Mexico, so that’s kind of how it came together,” said Vondruska.

Building on the momentum, Vondruska established a society called Camino Verde (Green Path). “I have then for the last eight years gone to Mexico two to five times a year to teach courses, to which sometimes up to 500 people came,” explained Vondruska. “The University of Mexico invited me to teach a program for the students. The agriculture college and other universities in Mexico have asked me to teach courses and out of this a whole stream of Mexicans have now come to C Dar farm—we must have had 30 or 40 or more Mexicans come to us here to take the course.”

Yet Vondruska dreams big and he is now looking to spread biodynamic awareness way beyond the borders of Mexico. “It was my idea to establish a bridgehead in Mexico for going further into Colombia, also into Brazil and into Argentina. And this is right now happening, in 2011 that there are people coming from the south from Guatemala, Honduras, from Peru, and from Ecuador,” he said.

Camino Verde now has more and more biodynamic stations along this “green path”, which he hopes will one day stretch from Alaska down to Tierra del Fuego at the bottom of South America.

Vondruska credits his vision to Steiner. “It came out of a saying by Rudolph Steiner where he indicated that we have to bring biodynamics through the entire world, and if we don’t do it there could be tremendous cultural and agricultural damage

done. He said this in 1920,” Vondruska explained.

“We have now 1,000 people, farmers and gardeners who are working on this and one always wants to have more,” he said. “My friend Peter Procter does this in India and has 50,000 farmers. And when you look at 1,000, then you always feel a little bit humble, you know, but he started 25 years ago. So if I would live another 25 years that would be close to 100. I could also have 50,000 or perhaps a 100,000 or 200,000 because the time is now really right for it.”

What is the next step in Vondruska’s vision? “I need instructors, I have to teach instructors,” he said. “My son always says, ‘Dad what if you can’t do it anymore? Let’s say you walk off the job, you are kind of a little kingpin, and we have to get away from kingpins, he said.’ And that’s true, but it is very difficult to find people who will devote their time to this 100 per cent.”

But Vondruska is certainly not one to give up and his current focus is on continuing the biodynamic courses in Mexico and also developing instructor training courses. His plan is to designate two or three farms or universities in Mexico, Honduras or Columbia which are working according to biodynamics. “Along this Camino Verde (green path) there needs to be some exemplary biodynamic farms,” said Vondruska, adding that these farms can be bases for biodynamic courses and for spreading the message to others.

He looks to future generations to carry on his biodynamic message and embrace its philosophy. “That is where the young students need to come to this philosophy,” he said. “We teach people so many things, just so they have the tools. But why do you have the tools? Why do you have to know certain things? You need to know more out of the depths of your being. For everything in your life, in a sense, you need a deep inner philosophy.” 🌿





LIGHT AND DARKNESS

*What is light?
What is darkness?*

Dr. Rudolf Steiner makes it abundantly clear that as long as we believe 'light' can be seen, we'd be unable to escape our materialistic world views and actions. Light, as it is very obvious, cannot be seen - only the objects onto which light falls - the space between objects appears totally dark and as long as no further object is placed into it, it remains so. This situation may greatly shock us knowing that we are surrounded by darkness. Therefore, we avoid any further contemplation and do not take 'such a thought' seriously. However, if we truly live with this reality and know that we are surrounded and live in total darkness, our thinking and actions may take on new directions.

When teaching at universities or biodynamic conferences, I often ask my students to observe the moon, the full moon that is. Then, I point out that if, for example, one would put an additional moon beside the present full moon, one could see two fully illuminated moons. And in the very space, where the second moon is now placed and 'shining', one could observe that there is light (where there was darkness).

During the Middle Ages, people knew that the dark sky was light-filled, mystically illuminated - invisible light. In those long by-gone-days, our forebears could 'see the light'. They could see this light with their third eye and painted it in the form of a golden background on tableaus, scenes or saintly pictures. Yet, materialistic thinking has closed and often destroyed these third eyes that are so wisely placed in the centre of our skull and indicated with a red dot (in some cultures) on the forehead. We've truly fallen into a dark hole!

Knowing that light is truly invisible, will cause a total collapse of our present way of thinking and behavior. Yet being surrounded by 'darkness' is a wonderful experience which can give us a feeling of security. Darkness is like a coat, a cloak, a protective mantle or a skin.

Circumstantially, light reveals itself in many ways, of course. And due to this 'circumstance', we believe that light can be seen. Yes, we do get brown skin (when exposed to light) - chlorophyll is produced in the presence of light. We are able to move around at far greater ease when light illuminates the subjects surrounding us. That, however, does not mean that light can be seen. It simply says light is an energy that is present, which can be sensed but only circumstantially.

What, then, is darkness? If darkness isn't the absence of light, isn't darkness as much of a force as light? Darkness is a force we are working with when applying our preparation 500 (horn manure) - for the development of the roots, and light is a force we are working with when applying preparation 501 - for the development of leaves and stems. ☼

Spraying for humidity and rain

You may think we've gone totally nuts but... wait a minute! If, for example, 100 years ago someone would have said that one can seed clouds (with dry ice or silver nitrate) and induce rain, people would have said... 'take a hike – you belong to the nut house.' Cloud seeding is done in China, the U.S., in Africa and other countries, with results that do not exactly please everybody. In some parts of the world, cloud seeding has caused inundations and catastrophic rainfall, whereas in other parts, droughts followed such actions. In cloud seeding, clouds are 'bombarded' with rockets and dry ice is exploded inside the cloud – therefore causing extreme cooling down which, thereafter, may (or may not) cause rainfall. Steiner warned of cloud treating in one of his lectures and warned that it may cause one of the greatest weather problems of all times.

Well, in biodynamics, we do not want to interfere with clouds on a technical basis. We do not want to bombard or aim rockets at clouds. We want to do it organically. We know that there are elemental beings in the water, the earth, the air and in the light and we wish to stay in gentle communication with them. Our preparations are part of such a communication process. We, therefore, use:

On the first day: a spray combining Barrel Compost plus Preparation 500

(Horn Manure). We stir it together for an hour and apply it at sunset.

On the second day: We take Preparation 501 (Horn Silica) and 508 (Horse Tail). We stir the two preparations together for an hour and spray them near sunrise.

Remember, the moon must be in a leaf/water constellation. For appropriate times and details, we suggest that you consult the Stella Natura Calendar and Josephine Porter Institute of Applied Biodynamics. ☸

Tree Paste by Ferdinand Vondruska



For years, we have applied this Tree Paste (TP) on bushes (filberts, hazelnuts) and any trees (apple, cherry, chestnut, even oak) or on berry bushes (blueberries). Tree paste can be applied on almost any deciduous tree with most astounding rejuvenating results.

The Tree Paste can be quickly made as follows:

1/3 Cow manure (from a cow - no bull or heifer or calf)

1/3 Clay (any good clay - red, green, grey)

1/6 Waterglass (that's the stuff that eggs were kept in and stayed fresh for years - ground silica SiO₂)

1/6 Milk (natural, non-boiled, with cream and everything included)

Depending on quantity: 20 g of Preparation 500 - Horn Manure, for 4 - 10 trees. 40 grams for 11 - 20, 60 g for 21 - 35 trees and so forth - yes, less and less of Preparation 500, the more TP you produce. Add water until the mix is as liquid as catsup. It can be made thinner, if you wish to apply it with a spraying machine or a pump. Make sure that the TP is filtered before you use it in your spraying device as it will clog the nozzles of your machine. Remember, you must mix the basic ingredients most thoroughly, no lumps.

Apply the TP in early spring and late fall on a dry and sunny day. The TP must be able to dry so that it won't wash away in a subsequent rain storm.

The spring application will help the tree or bushes to close winter wounds, grow an exceptionally smooth bark and help the sap rise vigorously. It also feeds the tree through its bark.

The fall application will help the tree or bush to resist winter damage caused by a variety of insects and fungi. It will seal the bark and kindly protect the cambium during the winter.

I've rejuvenated 60-year-old apple trees with the TP and the bark became as smooth as a baby's face plus the trees produced good fruits for many more years.

In some areas of Europe, orchards (apple, pear, even wine yards) are sprayed twice per year with this wonderful mix and have proven to be the life elixir that the plants need. However, make sure that you do not spray it too late in spring as it may damage the leaves or blossoms. All ingredients are natural and harmless and will be integrated into the soil beneath the plant that you are spraying.

The Vortex is long overdue...

Our newsletter was due for years - however... we were missing precisely those contributors that were able to create such wonderful art work. Many years of work in 'secrecy' have, finally, opened the doors and a most creative team has come together. ... and we are able to present to you our latest creation: the VORTEX.

The word VORTEX: as in a spiral, whirlpool followed by a chaos, is used at the moment when one, for example says: "don't create any disturbances or chaos!" With this one wishes to say: This kind of chaos may cause problems - your agitation may cause great disturbances and may cause unwanted consequences. This may, indeed, be the case in situations that are stuck: in a marriage, in a political situation, in a company, a school or where people live together and so forth. Situations like this may, indeed, have to go through chaos in order to arrive at a 'new beginning'. It is well known that chaos can be followed by extremely unacceptable results - we are aware of this. Whoever causes chaos must know that it may be followed by something 'new'... Yet, often, the new creation may not exactly be what we may have been bargaining for. If, however, one does create a vortex, followed by chaos in such a way that it is well-defined

and executed, excellent results may follow. When working with biodynamic preparations, and before spraying them onto plants and land, one can do this in a oak barrel and with a wooden staff made of birch.

Certain preparations are stirred (for example in 20 - 200 liters of water) for one hour and to the point where a deep vortex is being created. At this point, one leaves the vortex 'to itself' for a few seconds and continues the stirring into the opposite direction - as vigorously as possible - splashing, frothing and gargling. In such a moment one does create a vigorous and forceful chaos... and it is precisely such a chaos that opens up the water in order to make it 'available' for cosmic information (of planets, of fixed stars and from the person who is stirring the preparation mix). Such information will stay in the water for hours and occasionally for days. Together, with the biodynamic preparations, which are stirred into the water as well, we receive a mix of a highly informed and wise brew. Within a short period of time we must apply our creation to seeds and soil so that it may stabilize and heal the soil and plants (fungal attacks, transformation of sugar into starch 501, etc.)
